Water Conservation Tips to Help Us Protect Our Local Water Supply

- * Take 5 minute showers or less! Advise all family members to do the same. Long showers waste a lot of water.
- * Wash only full loads in the washing machine and dishwasher.
- * Catch tap water in the sink when rinsing fruits and vegetables to water plants.
- * Catch water in the shower when waiting for it to warm up for watering plants.
- * Turn off the tap when shaving and brushing teeth.
- * Sweep rather than hose down driveways, stairs or walkways.
- * Fix all broken sprinklers, especially if they are watering driveways and sidewalks.
- * If sprinkler water begins to run off onto the driveway or sidewalk you are watering too long.
- * Landscapes need to be watered only 1-2 times per week during cooler months.
- * If rain is in the forecast turn off sprinklers two days before and two days after.

New State Water Legislation What Does It Mean to You?

Residents and businesses will need to cut back even further on water use as a result of action taken by the California State legislation to approve a comprehensive water package last fall that includes a statewide goal of reducing water demand by 20% by the year 2020. This legislation provides several water conservation goals to include limiting indoor water use to 55 gallons per day per person. The Casitas Municipal Water District will be required to get urban customers to use 20% less water as a result of this legislation, which requires all urban water suppliers to set an interim urban water use target and meet that target by December 31, 2015 and meet the overall target by December 31, 2010. Casitas will no longer be eligible for state grants or loans if it does not comply with this legislation.

"This legislation requires us to get more residents, businesses and institutional customers (schools and hospitals) to use less water," said Ron Merckling, Casitas Municipal Water District's Water Conservation Manager. "We will need to encourage our customers to have smaller lawns and more native plants placed in their landscapes so that we can comply with this new legislation," said Merckling. "We currently provide rebates for high efficiency appliances and smart irrigation controllers, which should assist customers in their efforts to use their water more wisely."

The indoor survey includes a test of showerhead and faucet flow rates, an estimate of toilet flush volumes, a review of all water-using appliances and a test for leaks.

The landscape survey includes a review of the irrigation system, irrigation design and watering schedules. The survey also includes reading the meter to reveal possible system leaks in the customers system. Casitas Water survey program is a free service offered to customers to help them save water inside and outside, and lower their water bill.

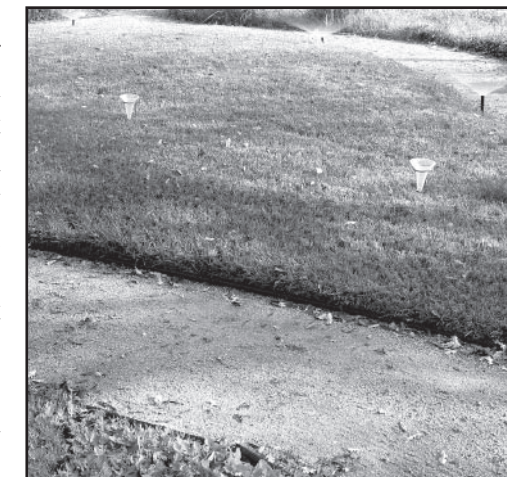
"Our customers will work one-on-one with a trained surveyor to analyze how water is being used both indoors and outdoors," said Casitas' Water Conservation Manager Ron Merckling. "Customers will learn how to tell when they are over-watering their landscape and how they might alter their landscape to save additional water and possibly improve upon the aesthetics."

Customers will be provided recommendations for improving water-use efficiency; and

information on toilet, clothes washer and landscape rebate programs. Casitas will also provide free conservation devices including low flow showerheads and faucet aerators.

"The free water audits show customers how implementing recommended conservation measures can result in significant water savings. Casitas is committed to giving our residents within the district the knowledge and resources necessary to reduce their water use and save money," said Merckling.

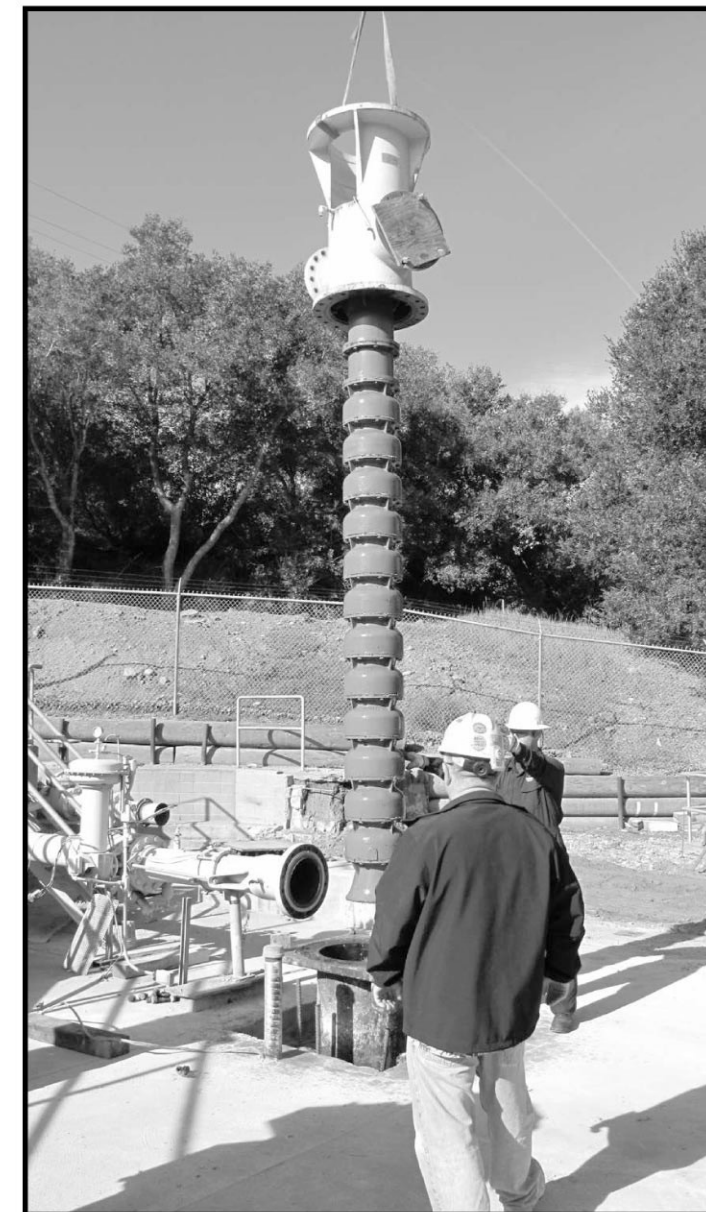
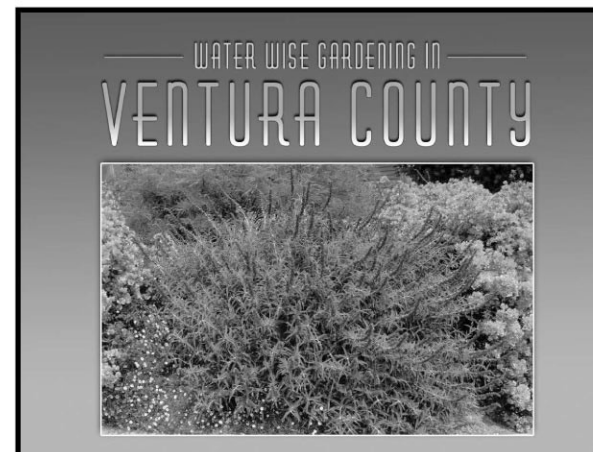
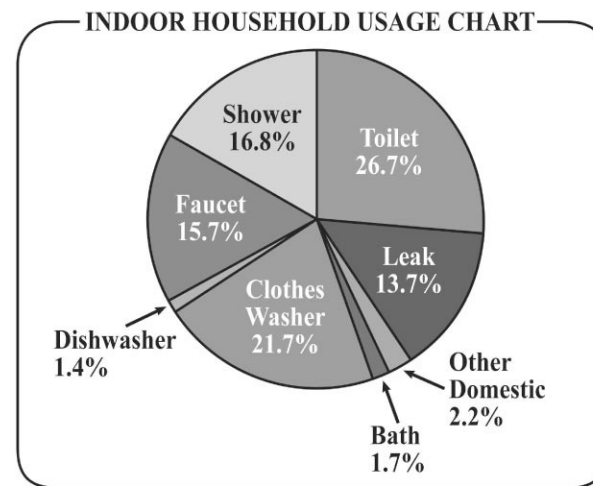
Your Board in Action

As part of Casitas ongoing maintenance, water tank reservoirs are periodically emptied of water, the interior cleaned and repainted.
